The Congressional Down Syndrome Caucus:

- Urges relevant authorizing committees to support programs and patient care for people with Down syndrome through letters and testimony
- Holds informational events for members and staff in Washington, DC to increase awareness of Down syndrome among members
- Ensures Down syndrome is adequately addressed in all relevant legislation and regulations
- Continues to build a sustainable, dynamic political force and informational clearinghouse by increasing membership and activities
- Works with national and local Down syndrome groups to develop leading educational, medical and work-related initiatives that support individuals with Down syndrome
- Identifies and strikes down barriers in Federal law for people with Down syndrome and other intellectual disabilities
- Expands opportunities for the Down syndrome community in education, the workplace and society at large
